## FOR A TIME LIKE THIS: THE CATHOLIC RESPONSE TO SYSTEMIC RACISM

NCEA will facilitate a dialogue on confronting racism in our Catholic schools and communities in a live webinar on June 10 at 6:30 PM EST/3:30 PM PST.

Arlington, VA – The National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA) invites Catholic school educators, leaders, administrators, diocesan heads and all those who wish to challenge racial injustice to tune into For A Time Like This: The Catholic Response to Systemic Racism on Wednesday, June 10, at 6:30 PM EST/3:30 PM PST.
