

Humor in the Classroom Increases Learning

I'm not sure about all of you, but I've found myself rather humorless on more than a few days over the past year. And it's a shame not only for me personally, but, as I'm sure you all know from experience, humor makes teaching and learning not only more fun, but more effective. And research backs this up.

According to the March 2014 American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education, there is evidence that, "appropriate use of humor can enhance retention, increase learning, improve problem solving, relieve stress, reduce test anxiety, and increase perceptions of faculty credibility. It also enhances students' attitudes toward the faculty member and can make the faculty member more likeable."

And there is science to back this up. According to the author of Using Humor to Maximize Learning (Rowman & Littlefield Education, 2007), Mary Kay Morrison, "We're finding humor actually lights up more of the brain than many other functions in a classroom. In other words, if you're listening just auditorily in a classroom, one small part of the brain lights up, but humor maximizes learning and strengthens memories."

In a fascinating study on instructional use of humor by R.L. Garner, humor was particularly effective for student rentention of knowledge during asynchronous learning (may we never again...)

So, when that middle schooler says something they maybe shouldn't have, just know it's all part of the learning process!

Make 'em Laugh

Suggestions from Rick Wormeli

Stop mid-sentence in your explanation of something and declare in a newscaster's voice.

Teach while holding an umbrella over your head, as if it were raining only on you. Don't say anything about it.

If you have the same set of -rituals and lesson sequence every day, do the rituals and sequence backwards.

At the end of questions on content, throw in a question about something completely unrelated, but interesting to answer.

Start dancing in a recognizable dance move to a tune only you can hear in your head. Secretly recruit a student to join you after 30 seconds. Watch the class join

in!

HOW TO SPEAK TO STUDENTS ABOUT UKRAINE

Adapted from Sarah Schwartz & Kevin Bushweller in *Education Week*

- Consider the developemental level: take your cue from the kids how much do they want to know?
- **Encourage their agency:** it is much easier to deal with difficult topics when we don't feel helpless.
- Explain why it's important: understanding what's happening in other parts of the world is essential to be a global citizen and thinker (and it's an essential to Catholic Social Teaching)
- Ask objective, nuanced questions: with HS students help them do the thinking by posing complex questions and give them time to do the reserach to answer these questions.
- Share stories about what regular people are experiencing: history is often told through the lens of what kings and presidents were doing, but the events of history are shaped by every day citizens.



As the invasion of Ukraine fills our newsfeeds and TV channels, we keep both Ukranians and the Russian people in our prayers. Civilians, young soliders, those risking their lives protesting, the Polish people who are welcoming refugees and those who are going to join in in the service of others. We also pray for countries who are suffering greatly from war but garner far less media attention - Yemen, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, and Syria.
